classic, "A Christmas Carol."

Joining Chavez was an equally talented cast, including Wendolyn Celestino, Nadia Rendon, Ruth Medina, and Abel Tovar as Jacob Marley and the three spirits, Adrian Rios as Bob Cratchit, and Rochelle Diaz as Tiny Tim.

Chavez made everyone feel the emotions of the play with his portrayal of Scrooge, a grumpy old man who hated Christmas and made others feel miserable because of his mood.

Scrooge experiences a series of visits from four ghosts who warn him that he needs to think of others, not just about himself especially on Christmas.

Scrooge is first visited by an old but dead friend and business partner, Jacob Marley, who tells him about the three spirits who will visit Scrooge. These three spirits, the first from Christmas Past, the second from Christmas Present, and the third from Christmas Future, take him on journeys to the past, present, and future, showing him that there are many who have suffered because of his wrong-doings.

As a result Scrooge feels guilt and remorse. His heart is changed, and

once again he becomes the kind man he had once been in his youth, giving much to the needy. ■
